EMERGENCY RENT & UTILITY AID

Rent assistance programs can reduce your risk of eviction, or help you get into housing if eviction is already underway. Utility assistance programs can help you handle overdue bills.

Emergency Rental & Utility Assistance

Provides financial assistance for rent and utilities to eligible renters in Santa Barbara County who have lost income due to COVID-19. The program can provide back rent (even if you are no longer in the unit), future rent, and/or aid for aid for relocating to a new unit. Payments go the landlord or utility company, so payday loans or other private loans cannot be reimbursed.

ONE-STOP SERVICES

Neighborhood Navigation Centers (NNCs)

A neighborhood-based “one-stop shop” for homelessness resources and services. Providers include City Net, AmeriCorps, Home for Good, Doctors Without Walls,

Showers of Blessing, CARE 4 Paws, Adam's Angels, and Behavioral Wellness. NNCs are currently held:

- Tuesdays at Commuter Parking Lot, 400 W. Carrillo St., Santa Barbara, 10am-1pm
- Thursdays at Alameda Park, 1400 Santa Barbara St., Santa Barbara, 4pm-7pm (meal at 6:30pm)

NNCs also host Reunification Hubs that can provide financial resources for people to connect with family or friends out of town, or new housing and job opportunities outside the region.

SHELTER & HOUSING

In Santa Barbara County, certain agencies are designated as *coordinated entry points* for people facing homelessness. Starting with them can help you efficiently get the help you need. In South County, the entry point is PATH (or New Beginnings for veterans or people staying in a vehicle, or CityNet for NNCs/outreach). In North County, the entry point is Good Samaritan.

Offers interim housing for people experiencing homelessness; housing navigation; and rapid re-housing services including short-term rental aid, supportive services, and case management.

Provides safe overnight parking to those living in a vehicle, with parking lots in Santa Barbara, Goleta, and unincorporated areas. License, registration, and insurance required. Rapid re-housing and other housing services also available.

The Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF) program helps veterans attain housing stability through short-term case management and financial aid. Serves those already homeless, and those in danger of losing their housing.

(Also known as Mark's House.) Transitional shelters where a family can stay together while addressing the causes of homelessness, working with a case manager to transition to independent living.

Provides housing, food, and case management for families. Three-stage program offers up to 120 days of emergency shelter, followed by transitional and longer term housing opportunities. Infant care and adult skills classes on site. Vaccination required.

Victims of domestic violence and their children may stay in a confidential emergency shelter for up to 45 days, receiving counseling, food, clothing, advocacy, and referrals. The Housing First program offers temporary financial aid, case management, and training to prepare families to re-enter the housing market.

MAIL SERVICES

U.S. Postal Service

There are several options to redirect your mail. Visit your local post office or usps.com for more details.

- A temporary or permanent Change of Address lets you have mail sent to a new location, like a friend or relative's house or the place you're staying.
- General Delivery (available for up to 30 days) lets you receive mail at the Post Office and pick it up with your ID.
- A P.O. Box lets you receive mail at the Post Office and pick it up with your key. There is usually a monthly fee (a no-fee P.O. Box may be available in certain situations).

The CalWORKS program offers temporary assistance to families in need. Through its companion Welfare to Work program, parents can get help finding work, child care, and work training or short-term education, and can get services to overcome barriers such as domestic violence or substance abuse.

The General Relief program offers small short-term loans to very low-income adults without children (repaid by work projects, or by deductions from future disability benefits if eligible).

DSS also helps qualifying households obtain health coverage (Medi-Cal & Covered California) and food aid (CalFresh).
